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2015 Review

As we reach the end of 2015, Dromore St Dympnas GFC can look back with pride at our achievements over the year and look forward in confidence to more success in the future. As a club, we are very fortunate to have so many loyal supporters who turn out in great numbers to support all our teams from u8 to senior.

Our children groups from u8 to u12 participated in blitzes throughout the year with our u10 team winning the shield competition at Killyclogher in September. Our u12 team also won the shield competition in our annual Charles Henry Quinn Tournament in the same month. At youth level our u18 team reached the league final but fell to a strong Moortown team. However pride of place this year must go to our u16 juvenile team who won the Tyrone championship with a great team display against Loughmacrory in the replay at Dunmoyle on the 24th October. There were joyous scenes on the pitch after the game, with numerous family photographs taken which will be cherished for many years into the future. From March to October the club provided coaching, training and facilities for 150 boys and 100 girls. None of this would be possible without the many volunteers who give up their time to manage and coach the various teams. On behalf of the players, parents, supporters and the club a big thank you to all of our coaches for their dedication and contribution to the Dromore parish.

Our u21 team had a great run through to the championship final with wins over Errigal Ciaran, Carrickmore and Dungannon before eventually loosing to Donaghmore in the final by four points. The team showed great determination and skill throughout the campaign, and many players will now move on to play senior football for the club.

Our senior reserve team had a fantastic year winning both the championship and league with only one defeat in the entire season. The championship final against Coalisland on the 3rd September at Clogher was played in a very sporting manner with both teams defending valiantly and producing quality scores.

Our senior team again finished top of the league with only one defeat to Carrickmore, but also in the league semi-final at Gardrum Park on November 1st they again lost by one point to Carrickmore. In the club championship after convincing wins over Ardboe and Omagh we played Killyclogher and after a disastrous first half, the team rallied in the second half but left themselves a mountain to climb and again fell short by one point.

Our supporters, committee, players and coaches can now look forward to a break from action and recharge the batteries for next year. Blast from the Past

Dromore Win First Juvenile Championship Title

On Sunday 3rd November 1963 Dromore won their first juvenile title when they defeated Glenmornan St Josephs Strabane on the score-line of 4-3 to 2-2 in the CBS Park Omagh. In their first encounter the teams had finished level on 1-5 with Glenmornan scoring a late equalizer after Kieran McElduff had sent a screaming shot to the left hand corner of the net with five minutes left in the game. In the replay Dromore raced into a commanding first half lead with three goals from captain John Donaghey, one of which was direct from a 50 yard free and another from Seamus Donaghey. In the second half Glenmornan rallied and scored two goals one from the penalty spot by McGonagle. The trophy was later presented to John Donaghey by Paddy Devlin on behalf of the West Tyrone Board

Dromore St Dympnas were taking part for the first time as Tyrone champions and reached the semi-finals after narrow victories over Enniskillen and Letterkenny. Both teams were totally committed and produced a high standard of football throughout the game with Clann Eireann emerging as winners and lifting the unique Paul McGirr Trophy for 2015. The league campaign began on the 8th March with a 4 point victory over Killyclogher in Ballinamullan. This was followed by home victories over Newtownstewart (2-14 to 3-8), Carrickmore (2-17 to 3-10) and Galbally (2-12 to 2-10), and a 1-15 to 1-3 win over Errigal Ciaran at Dunmoyle. League games took a back seat in late April as Championship action took over. The draw wasn't kind to Dromore, and a tough away fixture against Galbally was the challenge. This was a cracking game between two very evenly matched teams. A rousing second half performance saw Dromore come from 6 points down to draw level, however an injury time point meant Galbally were 1 point victors on a 1-9 to 1-8 score line.

Back to league action, and the final group game was a 4-16 to 0-12 win against Omagh at Gardrum Park, meaning Dromore had secured a home tie against Clonoe in the league quarter finals after finishing top of their section with a 100% record in the group stages. A superb display of attacking football against Clonoe resulted in a 6-16 to 0-8 win, and a match against Championship finalists Dungannon beckoned in the league semi-final. This was another excellent performance, with Dromore emerging 3 point winners (2-10 to 1-10) after a pulsating encounter. The league final in Galbally on August 12th however proved to be a step too far for this young team, as they were well beaten by a very strong Moortown team who completed the double for the second year in a row.



This year the u10 girls attended 6 blitzes and we hosted one in June which was a great success. The girls went to Omagh, Castlederg, Gortin, Newtownstewart, and Strabane. There was over 30 girls registered this year and attendance at training was good throughout the year. Training finished for the year at the end of September with the big breakfast and presentation morning where all the girls received certificates. The boys topped their league section to qualify for the quarter finals where they narrowly defeated Galbally in a high scoring contest. In the semi final they defeated Killeshil but were unlucky to lose out to Dungannon by the minimum margin in the league final.

However it was in the championship where they showed their true pedigree, but it all could have ended so early when they were faced with a tough draw away to Ardboe on the lough shore. Things were not looking promising with 10 minutes to go when the boys were reduced to 14 men and facing an 8 point deficit. However, showing true Dromore spirit, a wonderful last 10 minutes saw them overcome the deficit with two superb goals from Oisin McConnell and Oran Sludden seeing them emerge 5-6 to 3-11 victors. The quarter final saw another tense affair when playing a very defensive Killyclogher in Gardrum Park, again the backs were to the wall but they held on to win 0-9 to 0-8. The semi final was played in Garvaghy before a large crowd with Carrickmore the opponents, a poor first half saw the boys trailing at half time and it was only in the last 5 minutes that we eventually took the lead and held on for a 2-12 to 1-11 win. The county final was played before the senior county final and the boys produced a nervous performance and prospects were not looking good as the team trailed by two points in the final minutes. However centre forward Caolan McCarron came to the rescue with two superb points to earn a replay, and in the replay the boys were never going to give their opponents a second opportunity, as Dromore despite conceding a first minute goal totally dominated proceedings to win 0-13

So, for the first time Dromore got to represent Tyrone as county champions in the Paul McGirr Ulster U16 Club Champions Tournament, and they were not to disappoint, turning in two magnificent displays to defeat both Enniskillen by four points and Donegal champions St. Eunan's Letterkenny by three points. The boys were eventually to lose out to O'Donovan Rossa in the semi final, to end what was a truly memorable season in which they were a credit to themselves and to the club, many of these players will be progressing onto the U18 team next year and hopes will be high that we can secure some much overdue success at this level.

Positive Effects of Sports on Children

Children primarily choose to play gaelic games and other sports for fun, but it has many positive effects on children who participate. Younger children typically (6-11 year olds) have more fun with sports when played in a friendly manner, without too much competition or pressure to win.

Positive Effects on Physical Health

Children who participate in physical activities such as gaelic games experience positive health benefits, including decreased risks of high blood pressure, obesity, heart disease, diabetes and some types of cancer. It is recommended at least one hour of physical activity for children daily. Statistically children who participate in sports are also less likely to smoke or to use drugs and alcohol than children who don't participate in sports.

Positive Effects on Mood and Mental Health

Children who participate in sports experience positive effects on their mental health, as well. Physical activity triggers the release of endorphins in the brain, chemicals that boost mood and help prevent and relieve depression. In fact, the University of Florida reports that children who



participate in sports are less likely to develop depression than children who don't participate. Physical activity also relieves anxiety.

Positive Effects on Self-Esteem

It has also been medically proven that sports help children develop self-esteem and that girls who participate in sports develop increased confidence and have a healthier body image than girls who don't participate in sports. Improved self-esteem and self-confidence also help improve mood and mental health.

Positive Social Effects

Participating in sports provides opportunities for children to develop friendships, to learn to lose and win gracefully, to practice taking turns, to take on leadership roles, to learn to follow rules and to practice managing conflict. The social interaction experienced while participating in sports also improves mood and mental health. Although these developments are beneficial to all children, the Special Education Advisor website points out that they may be even more beneficial to children with special needs.

Did You Know ... Dromore Cinema Opens 50 Years Ago On the 28th February 1955 a new 400 seat cinema was opened in Dromore. It was the first cinema in the six counties in which a wide screen was introduced for an opening night and the first in which a film in cinemascope was shown on the opening night. The building was filled on the opening night when the management presented "the Robe" which was also the first film made in a new screen technique. The new cinema was a result of an initiative by Edward Montague. The contractors were supplied with most of the building materials by A Montague and Sons, a firm managed by two other Montague brothers. There were three prices of admission 9d, 1/6 and 2/- (4p. 7p, IOp) The building later became a ballroom of romance and was known as "the Big Ridge" or in Jrish Droim Mor (Dromore) THE ULSTER HERALD, SATURDAY, FEBRUARY NEMASCOPE A.
